GIFT FROM NON-LOBBYIST

Government official/staff may <u>not</u> accept anything of value, with the following general *exceptions*:

(1) an item, other than cash, with a value less than\$50;

- (2) a gift received because of an independent relationship (family, friend, business associate);
- (3) fees for services rendered in a capacity other than your official status;
- (4) permissible political contributions; or
- (5) food, lodging, transportation, or entertainment <u>if</u> accepted as a "guest" and reported in accordance with any applicable reporting requirement.

MISUSE OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY

<u>Rule #1</u>: You may not misapply any thing of value belonging to the government that has come into your custody or possession by virtue of your public office or employment.

<u>Rule #2</u>: You may not use state time or state equipment to work on an individual's political campaign.

Translation: You may not use government services, personnel, or property, including vehicles and office equipment, for personal, private, or campaign purposes.

Source: Section 39.02(a)(2), Penal Code; Ethics Advisory Opinion No. 172

Penalty: Class C misdemeanor (for misuse of property with value of less than \$20) up to first degree felony (for misuse of property with value of \$200,000 or more)

Sec. 39.02. ABUSE OF OFFICIAL CAPACITY.

(a) A public servant commits an offense if, with intent to obtain a benefit or with intent to harm or defraud another, he intentionally or knowingly:

(1) violates a law relating to the public servant's office or employment; or

(2) misuses government property, services, personnel, or any other thing of value belonging to the government that has come into the public servant's custody or possession by virtue of the public servant's office or employment.

Step by step...

- Step 1: Recognizing a request that triggers the Act
- Step 2: Identifying the responsive information
- Step 3: Calculating the deadlines
- Step 4: Determining whether a cost estimate is needed
- Step 5: Gathering the responsive information
- Step 6a: Releasing the information and/or withholding the information that does not require a ruling
- Step 6b: Seeking a ruling from the Office of the Attorney General ("OAG")
- Step 7: Waiting for the ruling
- Step 8: Receiving the ruling

TAMPERING WITH A GOVERNMENTAL RECORD

Rule: You may not:

(1) knowingly make a false entry in a governmental record;

(2) use a governmental record with knowledge of its falsity;

(3) intentionally impair the legibility or availability of a governmental record; or

(4) possess or sell a governmental record with knowledge that it was obtained unlawfully or with intent that it be used unlawfully.

Translation: Don't falsify a government record, including a calendar, report, time sheet, etc.

Penalty: Class B misdemeanor (for using false record) up to second degree felony (for intent to defraud or harm)

#12: The Job Search for His Wife



The Hatch Act restricts and limits "certain political activities of Federal employees both on and off duty"

Political Activity = something in active support of or opposition to a political party, a candidate for partisan political office , or a partisan political group

POLITICAL ACTIVITIES BY STATE AGENCY

<u>Rule #1</u>: A state agency may not use any agency money to support the candidacy of a person.

<u>Rule #2</u>: A state employee may not attempt to prevent or restrict a political contribution by another person.

<u>Rule #3</u>: A state agency, political subdivision, or private entity may not use funds appropriated by the state to employ a lobbyist.

Source: Chapter 556, Government Code

Penalty: A state agency may have its appropriated funds reduced by up to \$100,000 per occurrence, a political subdivision or private entity may lose eligibility for future state funds, and an employee may lose compensation or be terminated.
